New buses, expansion of the bus garage, a bus wash bay, Early Childhood classroom construction, new science room at West MS, and reroofing are a few of the current projects. Upcoming projects include additional long jump and pole vault, relocation of the shot put and discus, technology department offices relocated to District Services building, additional mechanic's bay, replacement of some original equipment at VSFAC, and replacement of foodservice equipment. Students at WMS and Nickels received new devices in technology. The district also purchased land, and the design of the new 5/6 building is in the works.

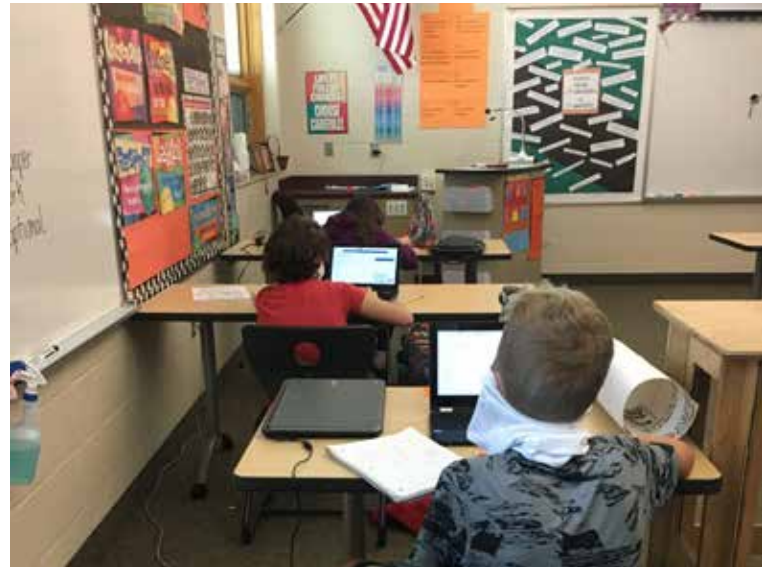

A time-honored morning tradition of raising the flag continues at Marshall Elementary. This year four flag girls from Mrs. Chateau's class perform this important task.

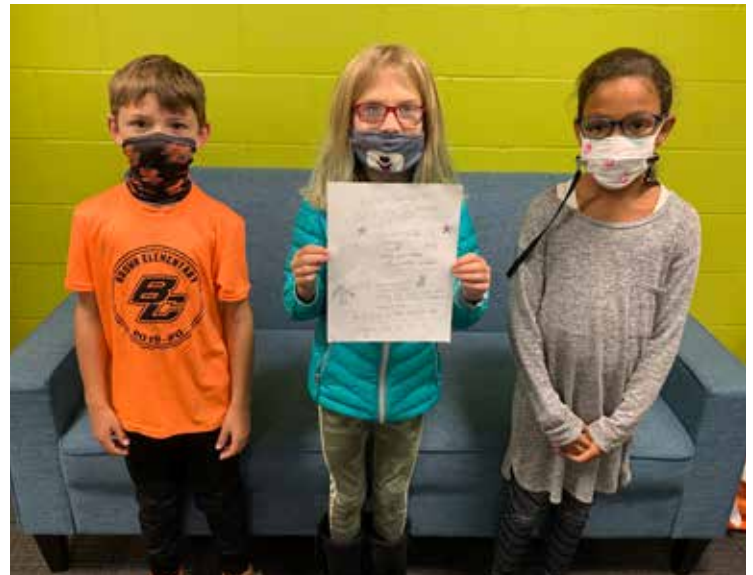

The BCPS mission statement was written with input from staff, students, and teachers. The goal was to develop a message that encompasses the staff's passion for welcoming and embracing all those who are connected and will be connected to Byron Center Public Schools. Communication with the community is accomplished through the BCPS District Diversity Team. Throughout the year, the district team meets to discuss and plan activities and report events occurring in each building. A monthly diversity newsletter is also sent out via email and is posted on the BCPS website.



BOOK-A-DAY

Marshall and Brown have been incorporating discussions and conversations revolving around diversity, equity, and inclusion through books! Teachers are reading books to students that include characters who may have similar interests, backgrounds, and experiences as the students. The staff and students have had conversations about the beauty of differences, whether related to skin color, religion, abilities, the hair on our heads, or even names. Literature can present students with different perspectives and ideas that build a community of inclusivity, understanding, and insight.

HEALING OUR NATION



At West Middle School, the 8th-grade English classes have engaged in circles discussing difficult topics. The English teachers tell their students, "To build a stronger community,

one where we feel safe, valued, and included, we need to start talking about some tough topics." To prepare for the 2020 Election, the students discussed how to build community and a safe place in our school for people with different perspectives. Each student thought about and shared their ideas on how to heal a divided country. Students talked about how difficult it is to understand people who think differently due to misinformation, social media, and people's lack of listening to each other. To overcome this, students gave various ideas: stop making jokes about people who are different from you, actually listen to someone who thinks differently, have a polite conversation where you can agree to disagree, read/watch information from a new source.

Zela Henline, a kindergarten student, was born with Spina Bifida. She was also born determined and is the ultimate fighter. As a school, we celebrated our second World Spina Bifida day on October 23 to shine bright for Zela and all those affected by Spina Bifida. We know that what makes YOU unique makes us strong.

Our Countryside students learned and celebrated what makes Zela unique. Spina Bifida is caused by the back not wholly closing, which creates a hole in the back, damaging the spinal cord. The spinal cord is what sends messages from the brain to the arms, hands, legs, and feet.

We may not walk the same or look alike, but EVERYONE is special in their own way. Keep tearing down barriers, Zela - Countryside is fighting with you!



DAY OF THE DEAD

Nickels' staff started the year by discussing diversity and inclusion. They passed around the book, "Teach Me Your Name" to read aloud and discuss the importance of inclusion and acceptance. 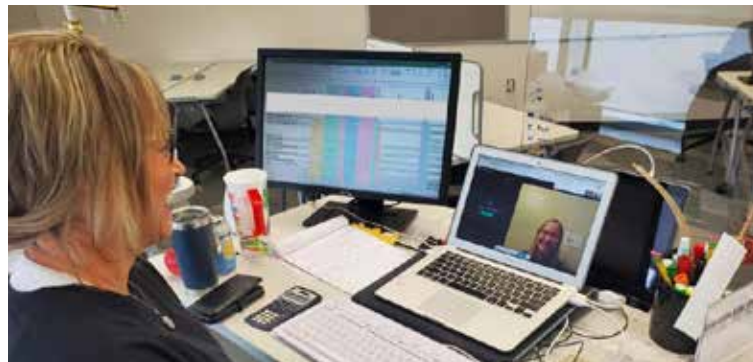


NICKELS

HIGH SCHOOL
