

Progress continues on the new Nickels Intermediate School. Construction leaders said the building will be ready for students and staff by the end of summer, just in time for the 2023-2024 school year!

"Our staff has a sense of ownership with the new building because we have been a part of the process. We can't wait to get into the building next school year," Nickels Intermediate Principal Tom Trout said.

Following the move to the new Nickels, the old building on Byron Center Ave. will be renovated and turned into a fourth elementary school. The extra building is crucial as Byron Center continues to welcome new families into the district.

## **Unified Champion**

Byron Center High School, West Middle School, Nickels Intermediate, and Marshall Elementary were named Unified Champion Schools through the Special Olympics for their support of the LINKS program. LINKS is an inclusion program at BCPS where students partner together to engage and learn throughout the school day and beyond. Students partner around school work, social behaviors, and building independence.

Being a Unified Champion School allows Byron Center to promote inclusive opportunities for students with and without disabilities, focusing on youth leadership and sports engagement.







### **Kids Heart Challenge**

Byron Center Public Schools elementary students participated in the Kids Heart Challenge to learn about heart health and overall wellness. Brown, Countryside, and Marshall raised more than \$60,000 for the American Heart Association during the challenge.





### **Kids Food Basket**

Byron Center High School, West Middle School, and Nickels Intermediate students, staff, and the community came together for the Kids Food Basket's spring food drive. The organization serves kids 0-17 in Kent, Muskegon, Ottawa, and Allegan counties who are food insecure. Byron Center High School's robotics team, Code Red Robotics, had a successful season. The team won its first competition of the year at Calvin University. During the season, Code Red Robotics was given a Creativity Award and the FIRST Impact Award, which is awarded

to the team that best represents a model for others to follow.

The team competed in the Michigan State Championship and traveled to Houston, Texas, for the World Championship where more than 600 teams competed!


















### **Scholastic Awards**





